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
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#### CELEBRATING 25 YEARS IN THE MAKING +

A little over 25 years ago, the Oregon Province sponsored a gathering called "Companions 2000," the focus of which was to explore and foster collaboration between the Jesuits of the Oregon Province and lay people steeped in the Ignatian charism. One of the first and most powerful examples of this collaboration unfolded here in Seattle when a group of spiritual directors from the local SEEL (Spiritual Exercises in Everyday Life) program met with members of the Province to explore how best to meet the spiritual needs of its directors.



The result of this rich collaboration between lay and Jesuits was the birth of the Resource Center: Ignatian Spirituality – later known as the Ignatian Resource Center and known today as the Ignatian Spirituality Center. As the ISC celebrates its 25<sup>th</sup> year, we are both mindful of and thankful for those who were instrumental in our beginning.

In a recent conversation with Cissy McLane, the *Resource Center's* first Director, she emphasized the support of the Jesuits in the formation of the center. She explained that Fr. Steve Sundborg, SJ, then the Provincial of the Oregon Province, and Fr. Pat O'Leary, SJ, co-founder of the center with Cissy, supported the center's drive to continually ask, "How are we being called together in a new way?" As lay and Jesuit collaborators discerned how best to respond to this question, what emerged was a resource center whose early focus was on supporting those involved in spiritual direction.

But Cissy also noted that the center continued to discern how to best respond to the spiritual needs of those we serve. As a result, what began as primarily a resource for spiritual directors soon evolved into an organization that served a wider variety of people by offering retreats and ultimately other spiritual opportunities like the Novena of Grace.

And today, though our program lineup has changed, the *Ignatian Spirituality Center* is enlivened by the same spirit that characterized the founding of the *Resource Center: Ignatian Spirituality 25* years ago. Our Ignatian roots challenge us to respond to the ways we are being "called together in a new way," and the tremendous network of Jesuit works in Seattle provide us with wonderful partners to collaborate with as we live out this response.

Our current programs and services reveal the ways we've attempted to live out this response. Of course, we still offer the Novena of Grace, retreats, and programs aimed at serving the spiritual needs of those in the region. We also provide "Spiritual Direction Connections" - a service to link people who are in search of spiritual direction with a director. But our programs also reflect the Society of Jesus' focus on a faith that does justice. For example, each year we put on "This Ignatian Life," a series of programs designed to explore issues such as immigration, racism, and sexism through the lens of Ignatian Spirituality. Similarly, in a world desperate for spiritual and social dialogue, we take seriously our call to be more ecumenical, as evidenced by our Advent Evening of Prayer sponsored together with Seattle First Baptist. And finally, we try to engage and respond to the unique needs of young adults through programs like our two-year "Contemplative Leaders in Action" leadership program.

As we look to celebrate our 25 years as a source of spiritual enrichment in the Seattle area, the ISC is extremely proud of our rich history and the tremendous Jesuit and lay leaders who collaborated to make our ministry possible. We hope you will take the time to join us this year as we celebrate our rich and spirit-filled beginnings.

#### ISC CELEBRATES YOUNG IGNATIAN LEADERS

In the fall of 2018, the ISC formed its first cohort of young adult leaders as part of the Contemplative Leaders in Action (CLA) program. This past year the ISC has been supporting a bright and enthusiastic group of fifteen leaders in their 20's

and 30's in developing their spirituality and leadership capacities. After a well-deserved summer break, the group recently gathered for their opening retreat to kick off the second year of the two-year program. They are excited to get back to work learning and growing in their small community!

One significant dimension of Year Two will include work on a Capstone Project. This aspect of the program encourages participants to develop a project which addresses a need, whether that be in their workplace, faith or local community, or other sphere of influence, and put their leadership skills into action. Another important aspect of Year Two is that the cohort will be joined by a small group of dynamic mentors (all Ignatian leaders in their own professions) who will guide and support them throughout the year as they share their own stories of faith, challenge, and growth in leadership.

The CLA experience also goes beyond the walls of the classroom as alumni invest back to CLA through their roles as Regional Advisory Council members, speakers, and mentors. One of these leaders is CLA alum Hailey Keller, owner of Peddler Brewing Company, who was a sponsor for the first ever *Discerning Spirits* fundraiser last May. Hailey shared her vocation story about following a call to leave her work as a teacher and opening a brewery while she was in the program. The ISC is grateful to her and the steadfast work of the CLA Regional Advisory Council who helped to the make the event successful and surpass the fundraising goal!

Looking ahead, the CLA Regional Advisory Council will begin their planning for 2019-2020, including opportunities for the CLA alumni community to gather, as well as build on the success of the first-ever fundraiser. CLA Seattle anticipates another great year of reflection, prayer, and learning together!

Fall has come with flashes of light this year, a kind of bright and boisterous autumn that Oliver describes. In the autumn of a spiritual journey, the black subterranean castle can also stir underfoot. Like it did for St. Ignatius, it shifts a vision and produces a harvest of ripe fruits. That God is active within us as in all of Creation, like the moldering in our sealed seeds and wandering water. We can reflect on and recognize the Divine in the spiced residues of our everyday lives. And with spiritual companions, we can share the NOW of our momentary pastures, where everything lives forever.

At the ISC, we share the deep roots and wide welcome of the early spiritual directors and extend ourselves to all who seek a companion for their journey. Our ISC spiritual directors come from rich and diverse backgrounds. They are trained, experienced and trusted companions, people that lead a deep life with the Spirit while helping others to see and sort through the "unobservable mysteries" in their own lives.

We know that the whole of our lives is the place to meet God. And we assume that God is the director, already present to us, everywhere, all of the time. A spiritual director can help us to find our way through our full lives, pointing us to where we can draw closer to the presence of God. We invite you to consider a spiritual director this fall. Perhaps you are busy and find little time for reflection and engrossed in your world of life, work or relationships. You may be facing tensions and pressures of daily life or decision-making. Or, you could simply be curious about your spiritual life and finding yourself asking persistent, important questions of, "Who am I? Where am I going? and Why?" You might sense a "ripeness," a readiness or season, to share your NOW with a companion.





#### A MOMENT TO PRAY: Universal Apostolic Preferences

The Ignatian Spirituality Center will be offering a 5-week series this Fall for nominated Ignatian leaders from regional Jesuit institutions who wish to enter more deeply into the journey of renewal offered by the Society of Jesus' new Universal Apostolic Preferences. The Society of Jesus is committed to paying special attention to these Preferences over the next ten years and have invited ALL their partners in mission to do the same. We offer you an overview of these Preferences and a way to pray with the first one.

#### Overview

The *Preferences* are the fruit of a process of discernment by Jesuits and their mission partners that lasted almost two years and culminated with confirmation from Pope Francis in a special meeting with Fr. General Arturo Sosa. The *Preferences* give a point of reference to the whole Society of Jesus and their partners, and are meant to capture our imaginations, awaken our desires, and unite us in mission. The new *Preferences* direct us toward four areas vital for our world today –



Showing the way to God

Show the way to God through the Spiritual Exercises and discernment



Walking with the Excluded

Walk with the poor, the outcasts of the world, those whose dignity has been violated, in a mission of reconciliation and justice



Journeying with Youth

Accompany young people in the creation of a hope-filled future



Caring for our Common Home

Collaborate, with Gospel depth, for the protection and renewal of God's Creation

#### Praying with the First Preference: "Pilgrims who show the way to God"

The Spiritual Exercises and discernment are instruments for a renewed apostolic zeal in the service of the faith, particularly in a context of growing and more widespread secularization. By following more intently the way of Christ, we are called to show Christ as the Way.

- 1. As I begin my prayer, I ask for the Grace of being an ever more effective instrument to bring others to God.
- 2. I am inspired by the example of John the Baptist, who leads others to Jesus.

The next day John was there again with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, "Behold, the Lamb of God." The two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus. (John 1:35-37)

- 4. I let myself be challenged by the desires expressed in the first UAP.
  - "We resolve to collaborate with the Church in experiencing secular society as a sign of the times that affords us the opportunity to renew our presence in the heart of human history."
  - "We want to invite all people to follow the path opened up by Jesus of Nazareth, a path on which we ourselves are walking, following in his footsteps, encouraged by his Spirit."

"We want to share with others the most fundamental discovery of our lives, namely, that discernment and the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius show the way to God. We need to follow the call to deepen our knowledge and experience of Ignatian spirituality, and we want to do so out of a living faith that is incarnate and consistent, a faith nourished by familiarity with God that is the fruit of a life of prayer, a faith that enters into dialogue with other religions and with all cultures. Our faith is manifested in works of justice and reconciliation..."

- 5. I consider these questions and talk about them with the Lord.
  - How do I live my life as a pathway to God?
  - How may we use Ignatian spirituality to respond to secular society as an opportunity to bring others to God?

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
