#### A REFLECTION FROM THE INTERIM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

e finish this Ignatian Year with deep gratitude for all of you who share in our mission. We pray that we all continue to "see things new in Christ."

Where have you found God this summer? Perhaps in sunshine, in laughter, in a round of golf, in watching the joy of children plunging into cool water, in simply sitting and admiring a blossom or a bird—or perhaps with ice cream or air conditioning! We glimpse the Holy in the small moments and the large. We trust the words of the wonderful Jesuit poet Gerard Manley Hopkins that, "the world is charged with the grandeur of God," most particularly this time of year. And even if we have no name for it, we know-we believe-that our God of surprises is at work.

Even as we continue to work to heal a broken world, it is important to see and to remember the beautiful and whole parts of it. As people of faith, we believe that there is hope in transition. Every step of our life's journey is a transition and a call to trust. Where do you see the fullness of God's work around you?

We are excited about our year ahead at the ISC. As a new interim Executive Director, I am grateful for our seasoned staff who bring heart and hope to this work. We are grateful for Carla Orlando, who has matched so many folks in our Seek and Find service, and the beautiful formation she does with spiritual directors. #### From Transition to Transition

n her book *The Other Side of Chaos*, Ignatian spiritual director and author, Margaret Silf, describes a time in transitions when almost every aspect of our life can be disrupted, when our old habits and comfort zones – our old home, our old job, or the old "me" – may be disappearing altogether.

In the midst of it is a mystery, says Silf. Something is breaking through and creating a new order. She reminds us that the Holy Spirit is at work.

In transitions, our faith is not the kind that "knows all the answers and has mapped out the right and proper paths, but the faith that says simply, 'I don't know, but I trust." Silf suggests that we ask, *"What is that essential core of who I am that remains through all this upheaval?"* 

At the edge of uncertainty is the new stage of growth and transformation. We could be developing new skills or personal qualities or drawing on inner resources we never knew we had. We may become more resilient or patient; more empathetic or creative. We may discover a sense of humor, broadened perspective, deepened sense of gratitude.

Our Ignatian approach to our lives of faith is to trust God when life is breaking down and to see our messes not as something to be rescued from, but as something that will help us break through to a place where God makes all things new.

Ignatian Spiritual Direction is rooted in the Spiritual Exercises, affirming the goodness of the world. It attempts to uncover the deepest desires of the human heart, the new choices for spiritual growth and fruitful service. It helps to identify inner movements and reflect on them, understand where they come from and where they lead us. Spiritual direction is not a program but opens up new horizons of self-knowledge, compassion, and deeper relationship with the Spirit of God.

## YOUNG ADULT PROGRAMS UPDATE



A fter a wonderful first year of connection, growth and community, Seattle's seventh Contemplative Leaders in Action (CLA) cohort are eager to begin their second year together. With facilitator Kelly Hickman, the ten cohort members will kick things off this September at their Day of Reflection. This day sets a framework for Movement III of the CLA journey, which focuses on leadership in service to mission. Through the inspiration of Catholic Social Teaching, the Universal Apostolic Preferences, and the Ignatian tradition, they will continue to explore what it means to be a faith-filled leader committed to justice.

Then in January, Movement IV will invite participants to integrate their learning and development in cultivating a practice of contemplative and active leadership in their

workplaces, churches, and the communities in which they live. The cohort participants will be asked to develop a leadership praxis in response to the needs of the world and the signs of the times. This final phase of CLA emphasizes the outward movement of their experience and formation as Ignatian leaders.

The year will wrap up with a Closing Retreat in May 2023 where these leaders will be commissioned to engage in ongoing service to their local community – and the world! Please keep CLA7 in your prayers.

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# A Prayer for Times of Transition

## Patient Trust by Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, SJ

bove all, trust in the slow work of God.

We are quite naturally impatient in everything

to reach the end without delay.

We should like to skip the intermediate stages.

We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new.

And yet it is the law of all progress

that it is made by passing through

some stages of instability – and that it may take a very long time.

And so, I think it is with you;

your ideas mature gradually - let them grow,

let them shape themselves, without undue haste.

Don't try to force them on,

as though you could be today what time

(that is to say, grace and circumstances acting on your own good will)

will make of you tomorrow.

Only God could say what this new spirit gradually forming within you will be.

Give Our Lord the benefit of believing

that his hand is leading you,

and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself

in suspense and incomplete.

Pierre Teilhard de Chardin (1881-1955) was a French philosopher and Jesuit priest. He knew something about transitions.

# In a time of transition, it can be helpful to create a space for reflection. We invite you to find a space with quiet, where you can rest your body with ease and openness to reflect prayerfully on these questions:

- As you slowly move from one season to another, what do you perceive as transitions ahead? What are your feelings and thoughts about those changes? How do they feel in your body? How might God be a constant presence of support to you in the midst of this change or changes?
- How have you experienced the slow work of God in your life?
- How might you allow God to lead you through your current experiences or challenges? Where are you open or closed off to God's love?
- What in your life are you experiencing with ease or joy? What in your life are you experiencing with instability or impatience? Hold these not in judgment or with the need to change these realities, but with tenderness and acceptance.
- What new spirit is forming within you at this time?
- What might you ask of God today to help support you in your acceptance, patience, or trust?
- What grace do you long for in the days, weeks, months ahead?
